



A History of Peace

In 1928, forward-thinking individuals had a vision of a formal garden on the U.S. and Canada border where peace could be celebrated. In 1932, more than 50,000 people gathered on the prairie to dedicate this sacred space. For 90 years, the Peace Garden has been a symbol of peace and cooperation among nations. It's a living monument serving as an example to the world.



World Class Conservatory

An unfortified international border is unusual. Just as unexpected is the collection at The Conservatory, home to 5,000 unique and rare species of cacti and succulents from every corner of the world. Our expanded Conservatory will open in late 2023, with limited access this summer. These plants display an everchanging variety of texture and colors, and show their floral blooms in February, peaking in May and June. This collection was gifted to the Peace Garden in 2009 by Don Vitko of Minot, ND.

The Conservatory serves as a library for protected plants that could someday be extinct. The work of The Conservatory demonstrates how understanding of political issues around the world impacts peace and natural ecosystems.





A Year-Round **Destination**

Hiking and biking trails connect acres of pristine prairie and wilderness, sprinkled with picturesque lakes and ponds. Take a break at one of our picnic grounds or stay the weekend in our summer campground. In winter, bring your skis and snowshoes and stay in one of our winter cabins.


Children's Nature Play Park

The Children's Nature Play Park is family-friendly destination. Distinct animal habitat play zones are nestled into an existing forest grove for fun and imaginative play while teaching about the animals, plants, history and Indigenous cultures of the Turtle Mountains through a storytelling approach. Children will enjoy the climbing nets in the turtle area; bridges, dams and lodges in the beaver zone; and a wolf-themed gathering circle with a fire ring at its center.


Centennial Vision 1932 - 2032

- 3 Floral Clock is 18 feet wide at a 45° angle, design changes annually
- 4 Promise of Peace Sculpture Dedicated in July 2016 by Wally Byam Caravan Club International
- 5 Seasonal Public Washrooms
- 6 Children's Nature Play Park Distinct animal habitat play zones nestled into an existing forest grove
- Conservatory & Interpretive Centre Thousands of succulents and cacti, restaurant, gift shop and historical and art exhibits; available for rentals
- 8 Sunken Garden Fountain Pool, landscaped with thousands of perennial flowers and plants
 Pollinator & Kitchen Garden Helps supply the Café with fresh herbs and vegetables
- 9 Carillon Bell Tower A 1976 Bicentennial project of the North Dakota Veterans' Organization, plays on the quarter hour
- 10 9/11 Memorial Site Steel girders from New York City's former Twin Towers, Sponsored by the Rotary Clubs of Minot and Brandon
- Peace Chapel Tyndall Stone walls are embedded with marine fossils and inscribed with quotes; Sponsored by the General Grand Chapter Order of the Eastern Star

- 16 Ducks Unlimited Dam Installed by Ducks Unlimited of Canada, a global force in wetlands and wildlife conservation
- Terrick F. Willis Pavillion Overlooks Lake Stormon; Canadian Centennial Building named after a former Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba



- (18) OES Picnic Area Sponsored by the Manitoba & Saskatchewan Order of the Eastern Star
- 19 Lake Stormon Named after Judge John Stormon of Rolla, North Dakota, who was instrumental in the early development of the Garden during his sixteen years as IPG president
